## A BILL

To oppose violations of religious freedom in Ukraine by Russia and armed groups commanded by Russia.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- This Act may be cited as the "Ukraine Religious
- 5 Freedom Support Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 Congress makes the following findings:
- 8 (1) Russia invaded, illegally occupied, and at-
- 9 tempted to annex the Crimea region of Ukraine in
- 10 February 2014, continues to occupy and control that

- region, and has exercised control over part of the Donbas region of eastern Ukraine since April 2014 through non-state armed groups and illegal entities it has established, instigated, commanded, and supported, including with military and intelligence personnel on the ground from Russia.
  - (2) International humanitarian law, including the Geneva Conventions, to which Russia is a signatory, requires Russia to respect and protect the religious freedom of the inhabitants of the territory it occupies or controls, including through organized non-state armed groups and illegal entities it commands and supports, and holds Russia responsible for violations of religious freedom in this territory.
  - (3) According to the Department of State's International Religious Freedom Reports, and other reporting, violations of religious freedom in the Crimea region of Ukraine since Russia invaded and occupied the territory have included abduction, detention and imprisonment, torture, forced psychiatric hospitalizations, fines, restrictions on missionary activities, confiscations of property, including churches and meeting halls, expulsions and obstructions to reentry, denying registration of religious groups, vandalism, fines, and banning peaceful religious groups,

and targeted groups have included Muslim Crimean
Tatars, the Orthodox Church of Ukraine, formerly
the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the Kyivan Patriarchate, the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church,
Protestant Christians, and Jehovah's Witnesses.

(4) According to the Department of State's International Religious Freedom Reports, violations of religious freedom in the part of the Donbas region of Ukraine controlled by armed groups commanded by Russia have included detention and imprisonment, torture, confiscation of property, including churches and meeting halls, physical assaults and threats of violence, vandalism, fines, restrictions on missionary activities, religious services, ceremonies, gatherings, and literature, and banning of peaceful religious groups, and targeted groups have included the Orthodox Church of Ukraine, formerly the Ukrainian Orthodox Church-Kyiv Patriarchate, the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church, Protestant Christians, and Jehovah's Witnesses.

(5) The International Religious Freedom Act of 1998, as amended by the Frank R. Wolf International Religious Freedom Act, requires the President to—

1	(A) designate a foreign country as a coun-
2	try of particular concern for religious freedom
3	when its government has engaged in or toler-
4	ated particularly severe violations of religious
5	freedom in that country over the previous 12
6	months;
7	(B) take one or more of the actions de-
8	scribed in paragraphs (9) through (15) of sec-
9	tion 405(a) of the International Religious Free-
10	dom Act of 1998 (22 U.S.C. 6445(a)), or com-
11	mensurate actions in substitution, not later
12	than 90 days, or 180 days in case of a delay
13	under paragraph (3), after the date of the des-
14	ignation of a country as a country of particular
15	concern for religious freedom; and
16	(C) designate a foreign country on a "Spe-
17	cial Watch List" when its government has en-
18	gaged in or tolerated severe violations of reli-
19	gious freedom in that country over the previous
20	12 months.
21	(6) The Secretary of State designated Russia
22	for the "Special Watch List" on November 28,
23	2018, and redesignated Russia for the "Special
24	Watch List" on December 18, 2019, and December
25	2, 2020.

1	SEC. 4. DESIGNATION OF RUSSIA AS A COUNTRY OF PAR
2	TICULAR CONCERN FOR RELIGIOUS FREE
3	DOM.
4	For purposes of making a determination of whether
5	to designate Russia as a country of particular concern for
6	religious freedom under section 402 of the Internationa
7	Religious Freedom Act of 1998 (22 U.S.C. 6442), the
8	President shall consider any particularly severe violation
9	of religious freedom in the territory of Ukraine that Rus-
10	sia occupies or controls, including controls through non-
11	state armed groups and illegal entities it commands and
12	supports, during the period of time that is the basis for
13	the determination and designation, to be a particularly se-
14	vere violation of religious freedom that the Government
15	of Russia has engaged in or tolerated.
16	SEC. 5. DETERMINATION OF BUDGETARY EFFECTS.
17	The budgetary effects of this Act, for the purpose of
18	complying with the Statutory Pay-As-You-Go Act of 2010,
19	shall be determined by reference to the latest statement
20	titled "Budgetary Effects of PAYGO Legislation" for this
21	Act, submitted for printing in the Congressional Record
22	by the Chairman of the House Budget Committee, pro-
23	vided that such statement has been submitted prior to the
24	vote on passage.
